AREA V BEGINS THIRD YEAR OF OPERATION

The award of \$8,802,324 from HEW to the California Region, announced July 2, by Paul D. Ward, Executive Director of CCRMP, makes the following allocations for AREA V:

\$137,000 for a new project--the teaching and demonstration program for early detection and management of chronic obstructive respiratory disease--proposed by Wilbur Y. Hallett, M.D.

\$565,000 second-year funding for AREA V's operational project, CCU Training for Physicians and Nurses.

\$762,000 for administrative core support.

The awards are for a 14-month period beginning July 1, 1969.

"I want to express my gratitude for the interest and efforts of the volunteers who are so essential to RMP," states Dr. Petit, Area Coordinator. "This funding, while considerable, is but a small percentage of the money spent for health care in L. A. County and if it is to be effective, must continue to be matched ten to one in value by the free time donated by physicians, other members of the health team and citizens who are enabling AREA V to move ahead."

REPORT OF THE REVIEW COMMITTEE ON SITE VISIT OF CALIFORNIA REGION

Anthony L. Komaroff, M.D., Operations Officer, DRMP, writing to Paul D. Ward, of CCRMP, says:

"Very briefly, the reviewers were impressed with the significant progress which had been made in the largest Areas--Area I, Area IV and AREA V. Each of these Areas appeared to have a soundly based organization which had adequately assessed its needs and resources, and was capable of moving effectively. . . . Perhaps the most impressive element of the CRMP is the vigorous and effective involvement of public and professional representatives at the local level. The reviewers were impressed that the California 'mega-region' was an interesting amalgamation of different important components of the health structure, and one which might conceivably serve as a prototype for other parts of the country. The reviewers were confident that the Region could overcome any organizational inefficiencies which might result from the structure of a 'mega-region.'"

OTHER NEW PROJECTS ARE FUNDED

In addition to AREA V's new project, five other California projects will be funded by the HEW award:

For improved post-hospital services through discharge planning - \$252,000 to Area I (UCSF).

For intensive training in cardiopulmonary resuscitation for emergency rescue workers principally in the area served by the Redwood Empire Heart Association - \$11,000 Area I (UCSF).

For a demonstration program with Sonoma Community Hospital offering to local doctors continuing education, particularly in comprehensive family care and in the specialized health problems of neglected rural families, including migrant farm workers and American Indians - \$128,000 - Area I (UCSF).

For a comprehensive cancer treatment and training program - \$399,000 - Area I (UCSF).

For a comprehensive stroke discovery and management training program in Orange County, providing team training for physicians, nurses and therapists in more than 20 hospitals and extended care institutions - \$431,000 - Area VIII (UC Irvine).

SECOND-YEAR FUNDING is provided for the following California Region projects:

\$445,000 - Area I (UCSF) for comprehensive care for patients with hypertension.
\$389,000 - Area I (UCSF) Training for physicians and nurses in CCU's in northern California.

\$102,000 - Area II (UC Davis) for a pilot program at Roseville, involving continuing medical education, in-service training for paramedical personnel, diagnosis and treatment of cerebrovascular disease and central nervous system malignancy, multi-phasic screening in a significant percent of the population, establishment of a visiting tumor board and community information and education center.

\$283,000 - Area IV (UCLA) - Coronary care training program for physicians,
\$191,000 - Area IV (UCLA) - Survey and planning for the health needs of Pacoima and San Fernando Valley Communities
\$436,000 - Area IV (UCLA) - Medical Television Network.

\$284,000 - Area VIII (UC Irvine) Pediatric Pulmonary demonstration center for Orange County.
