Dear Josh,

I am very happy to accept your invitation to contribute to the Symposium on Genetics in Medical Research* at Madison in April 1958. I apologise for my inordinate delay in letting you have a definite answer; it was caused by some uncertainties (of a personal kind) about my plans.*

The subject you propose that I should discuss is a large one, and I think the difficulty will be to decide what to put in that will be both comprehensible and instructive to your medical educators, etc. and yet not too dull for the more initiated. I have not followed recent work on genetics of animal viruses (largely because of the difficulty of judging the validity of inferences when one has no personal experience with the techniques); in consequence I do not feel myself properly qualified to review this part of the subject, and would prefer not to deal with it if it can be covered by someone else, or to deal with it summarily, if it falls to me (unless you would prefer to get someone in a better position than me to cover both the bacterial and viral fields; if you did wish to I should of course quite understand your position). I shall, however, continue to brood upon what would be a suitable presentation, and if you really want me to have a go, despite my limitations, I might perhaps prepare a skeleton and send it to you to see if it seemed the kind of approach which would be suitable.

From the personal point of view, I should of course greatly enjoy re-visiting the U.S. and Madison in particular, with the aid of the generous travel allowance from the Symposium.
